
Welcome to our ten year review, by Brendan, aged 18

I was surprised but pleased when Hythe House asked if I'd say something about their 10th birthday for this brochure. It's been ten years in which Hythe House has played a big part of my life. I came into care when I was 8, and it felt like the end of the world.

Ten years is a long time. For me, it's been over half my life.

When I was ten, I wasn't able to live with my own family, and to be honest, I didn't have a lot of happy memories from when I was a kid. I was also starting to get into trouble. From my personal experience of being placed in care at a young age, it can be scary not knowing who you will meet and what the future holds for you, and it can be overwhelming to a young person. But there was no need to be frightened. Everyone I met in Hythe House valued me and genuinely had a kind and caring nature. Growing up with my foster carers made all the difference in the world to me. I left with many happy memories of my time spent with Hythe House, and life skills that have put me in good stead for the future. Now I am training to be a mechanic, and about to go into my third and final year. I know I couldn't have achieved that without the support of my foster carers and Hythe House, so that's one reason I'm very proud to be a part of this brochure.




'I started to do really well at school for the first time in my life. I was star pupil several times, and I began to feel like I could achieve something.'

'Being around caring adults, and learning their life skills means that I can now help other people who've had sad or bad experiences, as I can understand what's happened to them.' Brendan


Everyone deserves happy memories of childhood
